Laura, Jan, Kristi, Kelly-Ann, Barb, Jane, Gail, and Simon met Jenny at the SISC dock. The SISC Dinghy Program generously provided a coach boat, with Fleet Capt. Dinghy Douglas kindly volunteering to drive.
