As I had opted for the strong silent type of crew (single-handed) and the breeze was up, I was soon spit out the back. John drove over the top of me and I was forced to tack to clear my wind.

The Aussies soon moved into the lead, closely pursued by our John H. Nicky and Jill were battling it out with me for fourth place, well back. As I rounded, as I usually do, I scanned the wind to weather for tactical information and saw that the wind on the Saltspring shore was stronger. I gybed immediately and a few minutes later had passed the fleet and was in the lead.



My down wind technique is to peg the tiller amidships right after getting on course, get the spinnaker up and fly it from the crew's position, steering the boat by transferring my weight from foot to foot and letting the heel of the boat steer her. It basically eliminates helmsman errors and lets vou concentrate on good sail setting and crew work. John Hillier and Gail Bryn-Jones were also having a great downwind let and moved into second place. My skipper and crew both botched the take down and the fleet was very close behind on

the second beat. The wind was up again and I was flogging half my mainsail to keep the

boat on her feet, plus I was hiking like a teenager—what was that all about? John almost sailed through my lee, then tacked off while I lead the Aussies into Boulder Bay. (It was not quite team racing but a bit sneaky.) Both the Aussies passed me but John lead the way and Nicky and Jill had come up to second.

Again I gybed right away at Ganges Shoal and played the stronger winds inshore. I eased by the two Aussies as John Hassen was mansplaining the spinnaker to Jane Squier, and I also managed to ease by Nicky and Jill to be second, before slipping ahead of John Hillier to regain the lead.

Things were looking good for me, but it was not to be so. John Hassen relinquished the helm to Jane Squier, who's talent downwind had been demonstrated last week and she slipped through my lee to take the win. SISC boats took 2nd, 3rd and 4th places.
